Greetings from **Nancy Morris**, Tan Chingfen Graduate School of Nursing PhD Program Director. This Newsletter highlights and recognizes the accomplishments of students in the PhD in Nursing program and recent graduates. We want to share their interests in asking and answering questions, conducting research, disseminating results, advancing nursing science, exploring nursing education, engaging in professional organizations, networking, promoting health and justice for all, and beginning to steward the discipline.

We've had 6 students earn their PhD degree this past year with 2 graduating in December 2023. One graduate is a Clinical Nursing Director at an academic medical center, two have academic positions and one is back in school pursuing a post-master's nurse practitioner certificate. Our two December graduates are looking forward to their next steps. Fall 2023 we had 25 PhD nursing students engaged in coursework and completing their dissertations. The Tan Chingfen Graduate School of Nursing welcomed **Teri Aronowitz**, PhD, APRN, FNP-BC, FAAN this past summer into the role of Associate Dean for Innovation and Scholarship. **Susan Sullivan-Bolyai**, Professor Emeritus, is still involved in the school where she continues to mentor PhD nursing students. We are fortunate to have the wisdom and expertise of both nurse scientists who mentor and support students and faculty with their scholarly endeavors. In addition, we welcomed **Jessica Pagano-Therrien**, PhD, RN, CPNP-PC to the faculty role in the PhD in Nursing Program. She brings qualitative expertise along with knowledge of research ethics and regulations as she also serves as the Chair of the UMass Medical School Institutional Review Board (IRB).

This past year a group of PhD students, with student Jen Costa as a primary organizer, began a Peer Mentoring Program - an informal discussion of all things important to PhD nursing students. Conducted via Zoom the peer mentorship program aims to provide a dynamic and supportive forum for PhD nursing students in course work and the dissertation phase. The program promotes the sharing of knowledge and experience while providing opportunities to foster academic success and well-being.

Cassandra "Cassie" M. Godzik, PhD, APRN, PMHNP-BC, CNE is a 2020 graduate of our program and is currently the Director of Nursing Education Initiatives at The American Association of Colleges of Nursing. Dr. Godzik completed a Postdoctoral Research Fellow opportunity at Dartmouth Health System in New Hampshire. She worked on a T32 at Dartmouth College and Dartmouth Health Systems in the Department of Psychiatry from 2020 until 2023. She is currently submitting local and multi-site grants for federal foundations and private foundations to secure monies to continue her work in strengthening the health and resilience of healthcare workers to improve systems across the United States.

The focus of her current scholarship is twofold. She is interested in psychiatric

interventions to improve sleep and reduce depressive symptoms and she is interested in the healthcare workforce. Specifically Dr. Godzik is focused on coming to a better understanding of moral injury and distress among the healthcare workforce, healthcare workforce violence, and the education of the healthcare workforce nursing assistants, undergraduate, graduate, post-graduate and practicing nurses.

When asked about words of advice for current PhD students, Dr. Godzik offers this,

"Identify mentors that are doing interesting work that you want to participate in. It doesn't necessarily need to end up being what you study for in your doctoral work or postdoctoral education; however, getting exposure to different research studies and ways of engaging interprofessional with nurse scientists and non-nurse scientists is critical for developing important skills that you will use in your own personal studies. You will also get experience with grant writing processes, understand what you do/don't like in the world of research, and identify where your true interests lay so you can contribute to nursing science throughout your career."

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
