UMass Chan Early Independence Fellows Program

Goals:

to recruit exceptionally talented junior scientists with the potential to become independent investigators and provide career development, mentoring, and financial support to foster scientific excellence and leadership.

Fellows will join one of two tracks:

Chan Fellows track: The Chan Fellows track will support two fellows who will develop an independent research program that broadly aligns with any area of excellence at UMass Chan. Fellows will be affiliated with UMass Chan academic departments and centers that align with their proposed research directions.

RTI Maraganore Fellows track: The Maraganore Fellows track will support one fellow who will develop an independent research program in the areas of RNA biology or RNA therapeutics. Fellow will be affiliated with the RNA Therapeutics Institute (RTI).

Chan/Maraganore Early Independence Fellows Program



Eligibility: Candidates with a PhD, MD or MD/PhD (within 24 months post completion of their terminal degree) from a wide variety of backgrounds, including, but not restricted to, individuals from groups underrepresented in the biomedical research workforce *MD-only applicants are eligible <u>only</u> for the Chan Early Independence Fellows Track.*

Academic appointment: Appointment as Assistant Professor (non-tenure track). Mentorship: Team of mentors comprised of established research faculty and participation in iCAP Program

Resources and Support



Support: \$440,000 annually (includes salary, research support (personnel, equipment, supplies), and travel. An additional childcare supplement (up to \$10,000) to fellows with dependent children.

Application Process/Deadlines

Application and evaluation process: Application deadline December 1st, 2024.

Applications submitted through *AcademicJobsOnline.org*

Required application materials include:

- A two-page *anonymized research statement* that summarizes prior research and describes the proposed research program.
- A one-page statement describing how the applicant's lived experiences have informed their values, priorities, and career goals.
- A current CV including peer-reviewed publications.
- Three letters of recommendation
