Pride Month is celebrated each June to honor the 1969 Stonewall Uprising in New York City, a pivotal event in the Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer, Intersex and Asexual+ (LGBTQIA+) rights movement. The uprising began as a series of spontaneous demonstrations by members of the gay community in response to a police raid at the Stonewall Inn, a popular gay bar. The first Pride March was held in New York City on June 28, 1970, marking the first anniversary of the uprising. Pride Month has grown both nationally and internationally over the years to include parades, events, and activities

promoting LGBTQIA+ visibility, rights, and acceptance.

American Indian Citizenship Day

American Indian Citizenship Day is observed on June 2. On this day in 1924, the Indian Citizenship Act by Congress granted citizenship to all American Indians born in the U.S. The day celebrates the history, heritage, and culture of American Indian tribes. All the tribes have their traditions and beliefs. American Indian Citizenship Day celebrates their contribution to the country's culture and a reminder of their enduring legacy.



Juneteenth: Juneteenth, June 19th, 1865, marks our country's second independence day. Although it has long been commemorated in the African American community, this monumental day remains largely unknown to most Americans. On January 1st, 1863, President Abraham Lincoln put the Emancipation Proclamation into effect, emancipating enslaved Africans in America and "ending" chattel slavery in this country. But this news of freedom did not get to the enslaved people living in Galveston, Texas until June 19th, 1865, meaning they continued to be enslaved for nearly 2 and ½ more years after

America declared all enslaved people free. More than 250,000 African Americans embraced freedom by executive decree in what became known as Juneteenth or Freedom Day. Upholding the principles of self-determination, citizenship, democracy, justice, and freedom, the commemoration of Juneteenth represents the day of true liberty for all. Juneteenth is celebrated on June 19th each year. It is observed with various events and activities, including parades, barbecues, music festivals, and educational programs that highlight African American history and culture. It serves as a day of reflection and remembrance, as well as a reminder of the ongoing struggle for racial equality and justice in the United States. The historical legacy of Juneteenth shows the value of never giving up hope in uncertain times.



National Immigrant Heritage Month

June is recognized as National Immigrant Heritage Month. National Immigrant Heritage Month is an annual celebration in the United States that honors the contributions and achievements of immigrants to American society. It is observed in June and is a special time to recognize the diverse backgrounds, cultures, traditions, stories, and experiences that immigrants from across the world bring to our communities. The resilience, innovation, and contributions of immigrants are at the heart of our nation's strength and diversity. This month-long observance typically involves various events, activities, and initiatives aimed at

highlighting the positive impact of immigrants on the nation's history, economy, and culture. UMass Chan Medical School encourages employees to "Take a Break" – Use Your Excess Vacation Leave by June 29th. As we get closer to fiscal year end, we want to remind you of the UMass Chan Vacation Policy and maximum accruals so you can plan accordingly.

As of the last full pay period of the fiscal year, the maximum number of vacation hours employees may carry over into the next fiscal year is 240. During the fiscal year, employees are allowed to accrue hours over 240; hours over this accrual limit are automatically re-set in the payroll system to the accrual maximum. **This year, the relevant pay period ends June 29, 2024. Accordingly, we encourage**

you to use any vacation balances over 240 that exceed the 240-hour maximum before that date.
