Research Meeting – <u>Presenter</u>: JungAe Lee, PhD, Assistant Professor, PQHS, UMass Chan Medical School <u>Title</u>: Regularized Regression: Ridge, Lasso, Elastic Net, and Beyond

Brief Description: Regularized regression methods have revolutionized statistical modeling and machine learning by addressing challenges in high-dimensional data. This talk explores the popular regularization techniques: Ridge, Lasso, and Elastic Net, along with their extensions. We discuss the concept of regularization and delve into the benefits and limitations of each method. Moreover, we highlight the versatility of regularization techniques by introducing recent advancements in outlier detection for high-dimensional, low-sample size settings. Practical examples using prostate cancer and South African heart disease data illustrate implementation strategies. Attendees will gain valuable insights into effective utilization of regularized regression for feature selection, multi-collinearity, and classification problems.

DIVERSITY DIGEST



LGBT Pride Month is a month, dedicated to the celebration and commemoration of lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender (LGBT) pride, observed in the Western world. Pride Month began after the Stonewall riots, a series of gay liberation protests in 1969, and has since spread outside of the United States. Modern-day Pride Month both honors the movement for LGBT rights and celebrates LGBT culture.



Immigrant Heritage Month was established in June 2014. It gives people across the United States an opportunity to explore their heritages and celebrate the shared diversity that forms the unique story of the United States. It celebrates immigrants across the United States and their contributions to their local communities and economy.

Caribbean American Heritage Month was established in June 2006. It honors and celebrates the rich and diverse culture of the Caribbean American population. During Caribbean-American Heritage Month, we celebrate the achievements and dreams of the millions of people of Caribbean origin now living in the United States while honoring the shared history of joy and perseverance that has united and enriched life across our region for centuries. There is no single Caribbean American identity. The mix of cultures, languages, and religions alive across the United States and the islands reflects the diversity of spirit that defines the American story.



Monday, June 19, 2023

Juneteenth is a federal holiday in the United States commemorating the emancipation of enslaved African Americans. Deriving its name from combining "June" and "nineteenth", it is celebrated on the anniversary of the order, issued by Major General Gordon Granger on June 19, 1865, proclaiming freedom for slaves in Texas. Originating in Galveston, Juneteenth has since been observed annually in various parts of the United States, often broadly celebrating African-American culture. The day was first recognized as a federal holiday in 2021, when President Joe Biden signed the Juneteenth National Independence Day Act into law.

MASS CHAN REMINDER



UMass Chan Medical School encourages employees to "Take a Break" – Use Your Excess Vacation Leave by June 17th. As we get closer to fiscal year end, we want to remind you of the <u>UMass Chan</u> <u>Vacation Policy</u> and maximum accruals so you can plan accordingly.

As of the last full pay period of the fiscal year, the maximum number of vacation hours employees may carry over into the next fiscal year is 240. During the fiscal year, employees are allowed to accrue hours over 240; hours over this accrual limit are automatically re-set in the payroll system to the accrual maximum. **This year, the relevant pay period ends June 17, 2023. Accordingly, we encourage**

you to use any vacation balances over 240 that exceed the 240-hour maximum before that date.
