2nd Annual First Episode Psychosis Conference by Emily Klein, Massachusetts Mental Health Center

On June 16, 2017, the 2nd Annual First Episode Psychosis Conference will be held at Massachusetts Mental Health Center. This

one-day symposium brings together mental health experts to provide state of the art reviews on the rationale and approaches to early intervention in psychotic disorders. Participants will better understand the current models of care in patients with early course psychotic disorders, explain opportunities, challenges, and strategies for early intervention in psychotic disorders in Massachusetts, as well as discuss approaches to enhance functional recovery after the first psychotic episode toward employment, among other objectives.

New Medication Approved to Treat Tardive Dyskinesia by Rachel Madhur, UMass Psychotic Disorders Program

Tardive Dyskinesia (TD) is caused by antipsychotic medications which are commonly prescribed to individuals living with mental illnesses such as schizophrenia, bipolar disorder, and depression. It is estimated that approximately 500,000 people in the United States are affected by TD. The symptoms are often persistent and irreversible and include uncontrollable or abnormal movements of the body and/or face.

In April 2017, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) approved Neurocrine Bioscience, Inc.'s new drug, INGREZZATM (valbenazine) for the treatment of adults with TD, making it the first and only FDA-approved product for the treatment of Tardive Dyskinesia. INGREZZATM has been studied in over 1,000 individuals and in more than 20 clinical trials during the past ten years before becoming FDA approved. **The UMass Psychotic Disorders Research Program contributed to this achievement by conduct-ing 3 long-term research studies on the investigational drug.** Christopher F. O'Brien, MD, Neurocrine's Chief Medical Officer commented on their collaboration and success in an e-mail to the UMass research team, "Neurocrine would like to thank the many clinical investigators and TD patients who participated in our clinical trials. UMass Consultation Service for Patients with Psychiatric Disorders by Maya Duffy, UMass Psychotic Disorders Program

The UMass Psychotic Disorders Clinic provides an outpatient consultation service for adult patients suffering from psychotic disorders with or without medical co-morbidity and substance use. Due to the consultative nature of the service, all patients must have a prescriber who manages their psychotropic medications on a regular basis. Follow-up care is not provided by this clinic. The consultation service includes a comprehensive psychiatric evaluation, discussion of treatment options, and a written report sent to the referring care provider.

The clinic is located at the **UMass Department of Psychiatry Ambulatory Services** at the **Hahnemann Campus**, **281 Lincoln Street**, **Worcester**, **MA 01605**. The Memory Study

This study seeks to see if exenatide, an investigational drug when used in people with schizophrenia, can improve memory, thinking, and possibly promote weight loss in individuals with schizophrenia.



The Early Treatment Study

The purpose of this study is to help understand if the experimental drug, paliperidone palmitate, or oral antipsychotic medication is better at preventing a worsening of symptoms of schizophrenia or schizophreniform disorder.
