Over the past year, she has grown both personally and professionally, with many meaningful moments for which she is deeply grateful: overcoming challenges alongside her co-postdoctoral fellows, sharing moments of laughter and tears in all her supervisors' offices and cherishing every "How are you" and "Drive safely" from her patients. After her postdoctoral training, she plans to continue serving individuals with SMI and return to China to contribute to the development of clinical psychology services, with a focus on culturally adapted interventions in the hospital systems.
