21st Century Tale of the Oregon Trail

Dear JK (John Kelly, MD)

I cannot thank you enough for the help and support that you have provided Riverside for Suicide Prevention which, as you know, hits home for me. I wanted to share with you a bit of that journey to give you a glimpse into the world of ultramarathons when it comes to running 100 miles. As you may or may not know, an ultramarathon is a distance longer than a marathon, but most folks consider a 50K (31 miles) the first true ultramarathon distance. For nearly every 100 miler, one has to have run at least a 50 miler within the last year to year and a half or so. Training for that distance requires a lot of regular running and there are different training programs to get one ready. For me, I would typically have a 4 mile run on Tuesdays and Thursdays with a variable run on Wednesday that was anywhere between 6 and 15 miles. Weekends were the long runs: Anywhere from 20-50 miles on Saturday with ½ of that distance done on Sunday as a general rule. This would go on for at least 3 months before the race date.

For the week before the race, I was on call during which time, I thankfully did not have OR cases in the wee hours of the morning which would have added insult to injury for what undoubtedly is a long run with sleep deprivation. I flew out early Friday morning to Portland, Oregon and got into my rental car to drive deep into Mount Hood National Forest where there was zero cell phone service. Thankfully, I was able to navigate to the start location where I could pick up my bib and have the pre-race pasta meal Friday night. Since most of the tent sites were taken and I did not want to get lost the next morning, I slept in my rental car that night which was cold and uncomfortable (temp was 35 degrees). Thankfully, I had my sleeping bag which helped a bit. Being on East Coast time, I woke up around 3AM PCT and didn't fall back asleep. I took that time to say some prayers and get my stuff ready for the long run ahead of me at 8AM.

At the start of the race, the temperature rose to a whopping 47 degrees which was certainly better than the 35 overnight, but still chilly nonetheless. Thankfully, the run got some heat going. In the early part of the course, we trekked along the Pacific Coast Trail which was burned extensively back in 2020 and it was quite eerie running along the trails surrounded by dead trees. The first aid station brought us back to the start after a 12+ mile loop. The aid stations essentially provide us with some food to eat and a spot to refill our bottles that we run with to maintain our hydration/electrolytes between aid stations. From this point, we basically had a 45 mile out and back running along trails that took us towards Mount Hood. For the first part of this, I felt great!!! I was keeping my pace in check and not pushing too hard or too fast as I did that last year

when my legs "fell off" at mile 70 which made the last 30 miles pure torture. After getting to the turn around point around mile 54.5 when it was already dark and was reliant upon my headlamp for vision, the pace definitely slows down. It is harder to see the rocks and roots that need to be avoided to keep from wiping out. For many of the miles after the 72nd mile, the course seemed to perpetually go uphill! At this point, my legs were tired for sure and the prolonged uphills (sometimes 5 miles of uphill) was slowing me down considerably. My pace on the downhills was not making up for time lost slogging the slow and steady uphills.

Somewhere around 3AM or so, I could see an aid station in the distance and I was so sleepy at this point which is where hallucinations can start to come into play!! As I trudged closer to the aid station, my brain kept on seeing it move further away from me!!! Thankfully, this one was not long lived unlike the hallucinations from a couple of years back. Fortunately, I made it to the aid station without veering off into the woods. Once I arrived there, I got in the most needed 30 minute nap which was exactly what I needed to continue on. Following that, I continued along the ups and downs which once again seemed to have more ups than downs. The sun came up and started to warm me up again which was a pleasant feeling from the darker and cooler night. Finally, I trudged across the finish line at 26 hours, 23 minutes and 18 seconds. Thankfully, the website has my finishing time since I forgot to stop my watch for another 9 minutes. One more belt buckle to add to the collection but more importantly, many lives saved by your help in supporting Riverside!!! For as long as my legs will carry me, I will continue to support Suicide Prevention and cannot thank you enough for your help and support.

I know that my father, my deceased mother and I are grateful for your help.

UMass Memorial Medical Center-Children's Medical Center Helmet Distribution Program Aims to Increase Use of Safety Equipment

A recent 5-year review studying the incidence of helmet use in pediatric patients at our Level 1 Pediatric Trauma Center revealed that over two-thirds of bicycle related trauma patients were un-helmeted. This led to a multidisciplinary injury prevention initiative to provide a bicycle helmet to every pediatric patient presenting with trauma secondary to a mechanism requiring helmet use.

The program began in June of 2024 with funds from the Rodman Ride for Kids. A multidisciplinary team consisting of pediatric surgery, pediatric emergency medicine, child-life and injury prevention, work together to provide helmets to pediatric trauma patients. When a child presents to the hospital with an injury related to a bicycle, scooter or other activity, in which a helmet is recommended, the team is notified. If the child was unhelmeted or damaged their helmet they are eligible. A team member will meet the patient, size them for a helmet and provide education about helmet safety. In addition, a pamphlet about helmet safety is provided and available in English, Spanish, Portuguese and Haitian Creole. The ultimate goal is to provide education and reduce preventable head trauma.
